To facilitate enjoyment thought scale, micro-climate and detailing




#### Active + Happy Streetscapes

The creation of attractive, accessible, navigable, livable, socially / economically active streetscapes.




#### Authenticity















## Fully Pedestrianised Section of George's St Lw: Typical Street Layout Plan






## Typical Paving Pattern Detail: Public Footpath









